

Why prepare the CTP?

(Comprehensive Transportation Plan)

To maintain Qualified Local Government Status, this assessment must be conducted every 5 years for jurisdictions within Metro Planning Regions such as the Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC) area, ensuring compliance with Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit **Administration** (FTA) requirements.

Goal:

<u>Funding support</u> and ongoing efforts for improving the citizens quality of life through transportation improvements.















Contribute towards ARC's mission for the region.



Review previous projects priorities and identify gaps



Gather input on emerging needs (safety, multimodal, autonomy)



Prioritize *short* and *long-term* strategies and projects for improving transportation

Section II Census Data



Census Data/Demographics

Incorporated in 1875, Douglasville, Ga is the County Seat of Douglas County located within the Atlanta Regional Commissions Metropolitan Planning Area. The city covers approximately 22.5 square miles.

Population and Growth:

2025 (proj.)	42,074	+3.8% (annual rate)

Households: 12,675 (2020 Census), with 65.3% family households and 34.7% non-family.

Households with children: 34.7%.

Density: Approximately 1,540 people per square mile (2023 est.).

Comparison:

- 2010–2020: Douglasville's growth rate (11.9%) significantly outpaced the national average (7.4%), growing about **1.6 times** faster than the U.S.
- 2020-2023: Douglasville's annual growth rate (1.57%) was approximately 3 times faster than the national average (0.5%).
- 2023-2025 (projected): Douglasville's estimated annual growth (3.8%) is substantially higher than the national projection (0.4-0.5%), potentially 7-9 times faster.













Growth

Race/Ethnicity <u>Compared to Georgia:</u>

Douglasville has a higher Black population (vs. 31.34% statewide) and lower White population (vs. 52.46%).

<u>Citizenship:</u>

Born 89.7% U.S., 7.9% naturalized citizens, 2.4% non-citizens.

ATLANTA	0.71%	499,896 – 518,107 (+3.64%)

- **Douglasville's** population is projected to grow by over 20% in just five years.
- **Atlanta's** growth is projected to grow with a 3.64% increase over the same period. Source: World Population Review































Land Use Map


















Existing Crash Distribution Map

















Road Network


Existing Road Network Map




Parks and Recreations Map




Existing Bike Network Map




Existing Sidewalk Network Map




Existing Connect Douglas Transit Map


